

## **Ian Clausen Earns a Marshall Scholarship**

Ian Clausen is the first University of Illinois student in more than a decade to be named one of the 40 Marshall Scholars in the United States. He will be using this full award (valued at approximately \$40,000 per year) to pursue two Master's degrees at the University of Edinburgh, a taught program in Theological Ethics and a research degree in Heresiology and Ethics.

At Illinois, Ian displays a penetrating interest in theology and ethics, both in ancient civilizations and the modern era. A double major in Religious Studies and English, he has collaborated with Professor Wayne Pitard, Religious Studies, on research interpreting ancient Near Eastern cylinder seals and currently is undertaking a senior thesis in English under the tutelage of English Professor Bruce Michelson. Ian's thesis scrutinizes the rhetorical strategies of Jonathan Edwards by analyzing key


theological documents, while considering the historical, social, and philosophical contexts in which Edwards lived, preached, and worked. Ian also attributes his development to other mentors who wrote letters of recommendation on his behalf, including Religious Studies faculty member Richard Layton (in whose class Ian began laying the foundation for postgraduate work on Pelagius, a heretic from the 4<sup>th</sup> century)

## Reflections and Advice from Illinois Scholarship Alumni

We asked various Illinois alumni who were awarded prestigious international scholarships to muse a bit on their experiences. Here are some illustrative quotes:

### What are your memories of the campus scholarship process?

*The application process is extensive and quite intimidating. I honestly thought twice about applying because I was worried that I wouldn't have strong enough references. A friend gave me the advice that you don't know unless you try. It is better to try and not get it, than not apply and wonder "what if?"*

*Writing my proposal became an exciting full-time job. I still read it from time to time and have used much of it in post-Fulbright contexts. I also have a very distinct, positive memory of my campus interview. It was wonderful to talk about my ideas with a panel of interested,*

*educated people. Good practice too.*

*Studying abroad and having access to scholarships was the greatest opportunity for my career... Every well-rounded individual should have this opportunity and be able to experience how life is lived outside of this continent.*

### Looking back, what tips do you have for future applicants?

*Even if you're a seasoned procrastinator, begin working on the application early—it will take at least twice as long to complete as you anticipate. When drafting your statements, try to be as confident and optimistic about your chances as possible—it will show through in your writing. Ask friends and family as well as professors to read your statements to get opinions from a variety of people. Proofread your work carefully and make sure all guidelines are followed.*

*Revise, revise, revise your essay. It can always get better. Don't procrastinate. It allows you to do the above. Be honest with yourself about what you want to accomplish and let that show in your essay. Be passionate about your future! I think the scholarship providers sense people with a drive and give those people scholarships, because they know they're going to work hard.*

*Consult the [Scholarships Office] and use them relentlessly through the process! Future applicants should start the application process months before it is due and get as much feedback as possible about their essays from scholars in their field as well as from the [Scholarships Office] and people outside of their field.*

*The belief and passion you have in your research must come through in your essay. Another very important aspect you must address is what you will bring to that particular country. Why should they allow you to live there for one year? Why should you be an ambassador? Furthermore, why is your research beneficial to the cultural ties between the U.S. and this specific country, as well as to your field?*

## Where Are They Now?

**Kate Corby** (awarded a Fulbright to Hungary in 2005-06) began choreographic research for her MFA thesis work *Rift*, which premiered at the University of Illinois in May and received the Wanda M. Nettl Prize for student choreography from the Department of Dance. Kate recently completed her MFA and plans on choreographing, teaching and performing professionally both nationally and abroad.

**Richard Komaiko** (awarded an NSEP scholarship to study in China in 2005) graduated in 2007 with a degree in Economics. Since then, he has been researching at the US-China Economic & Security Review Commission in Washington, DC and has recently written an article for the Asia Times [http://atimes.com/atimes/China\\_Business/K09Cb01.html](http://atimes.com/atimes/China_Business/K09Cb01.html)

**Kevin Hawkins** (awarded a Fulbright to Russia in 2003-04) works as the electronic

publishing librarian at the Scholarly Publishing Office of the University of Michigan.

**Connie Frigo** (awarded a Fulbright to Netherlands in 2000-01) writes, “It's nice to hear from the Office that completely changed my life! I will never run out of things to say about my experience. I've returned every summer to the Netherlands since moving back to the U.S. in the summer of 2002.” Connie is an Assistant Professor of Saxophone at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville and the baritone saxophonist with the New Century Saxophone Quartet, the only chamber ensemble of its kind to win first prize at the prestigious Concert Artist Guild competition in NYC.

## Reports from Scholars Abroad

### **Ryan Dick, Luce, China:**

*My placement at Tongji started as a regular 9-5, with two days of teaching and the rest of the time spent in the Office for International Collaboration for the College of Architecture and Urban Planning. I am teaching first and second year urban planning and architecture students, respectively. One of the professors at Tongji has his own design studio and invited me to put in some time. This small, 10 person outfit finished a 300,000,000 square meter project just before I arrived. In layman's terms, that is HUGE. The scale and speed of things here is unbelievable. Also, the flashier the better. In my free time I have been able to travel and delve into the culture of Shanghai (food, arts, language, etc). Shanghai is certainly a fascinating, complicated, and rewarding city!*

### **Angela Glaros, Fulbright, Greece:**

*Skyros is a fascinating island, where "tradition" appears to be a cottage industry that everyone has a hand in, from the singers and musicians I came here to work with, to the makers of local ceramics, to women shopkeepers embroidering Skyrian designs as they run their cash registers, to old men in vrakes (traditional baggy trousers) and trohadia (leather shepherds' sandals).*

### **David Kikuchi, Fulbright, Peru:**

*Peru has been treating me well with all its bright sunshine and lime-based ceviche, such that I now have a flip-flop tan...The folks who I work with are very helpful whenever I do figure out what questions I need to ask, and my research project is quite flexible on a temporal/spatial scale, so I haven't been sunk as a result of having an inaccurate vision in my head about Peru. But when I won this scholarship I never expected to be a simple babe in the cloud forest, barely able to gurgle my ignorance in a foreign tongue.*

### **Christina Carney, NSEP, Brazil:**

*I'm loving Brazil! I am still getting accustomed to Brazilian life and customs, it's definitely a challenge, but I'm managing. Before I came to Brazil I*

*was really anxious about my language capabilities. Everyone told me not to worry and that I would pick it up really quickly once I arrived. Though this is somewhat true (I've advanced from beginner to intermediate) I found that my language was stifled by the fact that for the first semester I primarily hung around American students and did not challenge myself enough to speak Portuguese...I feel that I could be at a much higher fluency if I had more Brazilian friends and interaction. I think part of it had to do with anxiety about being in a totally different environment and how your American friends can become your security.*

### **Sarah Taitano, NSEP, Russia:**

*I never imagined how much I'd learn, nor how quickly. I'm volunteering/interning at a kindergarten through my program and it constantly keeps me on my toes. I also attend weekly excursions to places such as factories, old cities, and museums along with bi-weekly roundtable discussions, where Russians participate. All of these extra-curriculars are continually enriching my language acquisition. I never imagined I'd be so busy!*



### **Jennifer Halvorson, Fulbright, Denmark:**

*Everything in Copenhagen, Denmark is going well. The experience has been wonderful and more than I could have planned for. The cultural experience alone has taught me a great deal about the people of Europe, and myself as an American. I have had the opportunity to live with two Danes, which has given me a direct window into the culture. I*

### **Elana Jakel, Fulbright, Ukraine:**

*Before beginning my research, I spent some time getting acclimated to Kyiv, which has changed a great deal since my last visit two years ago. I now have a research routine that includes visits to different archives and libraries on alternate days. I also have been taking advantage of the opportunities offered by the local Fulbright office, which hosts conferences and exhibitions and invites current Fulbrighters to speak at their informational events about the program. I recently returned from a trip to L'viv in western Ukraine where I spoke at four different sessions encouraging Ukrainian students and scholars to apply for Fulbright grants to the U.S.*

### **Grace Lee, NSEP, Japan:**

*At the International Christian University, every morning sees me attending Japanese Language classes, which consume 2.5 hours a day. I enjoy the company of 15 international students from Finland, Thailand, Philippines, Britain, Canada, France, Ivory Coast, and US who are also beginning to learn Japanese in my class... This study*

and English professors Dale Bauer and William Maxwell.

Ian is not only a theorist, but also a practitioner. He co-founded an organization, *Acting on AIDS*, with two explicit goals: (1) to work to alleviate the suffering of those inflicted with AIDS, and (2) to encourage dialogue with people of all faiths about related theological issues. Based on his work in building connections between community, citizenship, and the church, our Campus Marshall Scholarship Selection Committee found Ian to have the capacity to be a leader at the intersection of religious and secular knowledge. Obviously, the Marshall Commission agrees with our assessment!



Some days I help out in the classroom, other days I have conversation sessions and work with pairs of students. Other times I can give nearly the entire lesson. It is most important for me to be flexible and go with the flow of how the classroom teacher wants to put me to use.*

## Scholarships Administered

**Beinecke** (*deadline: January 30, 2008*) For juniors committed to gaining a graduate degree in the Arts, Humanities or Social Sciences. For U.S. citizens or U.S. nationals based on merit and need.

**Churchill** One year of postgraduate study leading to a degree in engineering, mathematics, or the sciences at Cambridge University, England. Seniors and graduate students are eligible to apply. For U.S. citizens under the age of 26.

**Fulbright** One year of study or research in any country where there is a Fulbright Commission. Some English teaching programs available. U.S. citizen seniors, graduate/professional students, and graduates are eligible to apply.

**Gates Cambridge** One to four years of study leading to a degree at Cambridge University, England. Seniors, graduate/professional students, and graduates are eligible to apply. For U.S. and non-U.S. citizens under the age of 30.

**George Mitchell** One year of postgraduate study in the Republic of Ireland or Northern Ireland. Seniors, graduate/professional students, and graduates are eligible to apply. For U.S. citizens under the age of 30.

**Goldwater** One year of study for current sophomores or juniors who are committed to achieving a Ph.D. in the research fields of mathematics, the natural sciences or engineering. For U.S. citizens, U.S. nationals or permanent residents.

**Jack Kent Cooke** (*deadline: February 6, 2008*) One to six years of study leading to a graduate or professional degree at any domestic or international university. Seniors or recent graduates are eligible to apply. For U.S. and non-U.S. citizens, based on merit and need.

**Luce** One-year internship in East or Southeast Asia. Asia studies majors/minors or those who have been to Asia for more than 4 weeks are ineligible. Seniors, graduate/professional students, and young professionals are eligible to apply. For U.S. citizens under the age of 30.



**Marshall** Two to three years of study leading to a degree at any British university. Seniors, graduate/professional students, and graduates are eligible to apply. For U.S. citizens.

**NSEP Grad** (*deadline: January 30, 2008*) U.S. citizens enrolled in or applying to a graduate degree program. May include domestic language and cultural study with overseas study or all overseas study in a non-western country. Funding for 1 to 6 academic semesters.

**NSEP Undergrad** (*deadline: January 17, 2008*) Open to freshmen through seniors for summer, semester, or yearlong study in a non-western country. For U.S. citizens.

**Rhodes** One to three years of study leading to a degree at Oxford University, England. Seniors, graduate/professional students, and graduates are eligible to apply. For U.S. and some non-U.S. citizens under the age of 24.

**Truman** (*deadline: January 15, 2008*) One year of funding for students interested in pursuing graduate degrees in public service fields. For U.S. citizen juniors.

We assist you through the prestigious fellowship application process in your quest for greater knowledge, personal growth, and professional development.

\*As an additional benefit, you just might win a scholarship.

Although many nationally or internationally competitive scholarships and fellowships are available for graduate and undergraduate study and/or research around the world, competition is steep.
